

# Sound Better Now, Accent Reduction for Japanese Speakers of English: Customized Lists for Japanese Learners of English (English Pronunciation for Japanese Speakers Book 3)



This is Volume 3 of the series English Pronunciation for Japanese Speakers. Volume 1 addresses the differences between English and Japanese vowels and consonants, and offers insights, strategies and tips for teaching them. Volume 2 addresses everything else in pronunciation--syllable stress, word stress, intonation, and rhythm. Volume 3, this guide, contains customized English pronunciation word lists created specifically for Japanese speakers. Every language brings its own set of interference points with English and Japanese brings quite a few! Discussing the differences and the causes for these pain points will help Japanese adult learners of English grapple with how the two languages are similar and different, so students can focus on the differences. Japanese students of English are often very knowledgeable about the differences between the two languages, but often not sure about what to do about it. This book contains materials I use with nearly every Japanese professional who needs to communicate with and understand Americans. These are the word lists that teachers ask for most often when I give teacher trainings. They are designed to give extra practice on sounds that are especially difficult for Japanese speakers. Drilling these will build and strengthen pronunciation habits that are critical in English. Learning another languages pronunciation means paving new neurological and neuromuscular pathways in the brain where none existed before...forging new links between the brain and speech muscles, and then making those new pathways habitual and unconscious. Intense, iterative, and frequent practice turns those unsure pathways into smooth, wide lanes for easy transmission of messages from brain to mouth. Without this automaticity, pronunciation will not change, since students first language has been paving and

repaving the neural pathways since birth.

If you are an accent reduction coach, or a pronunciation coach, help your students wrap their tongues around these English sounds. Have your students practice and record themselves, and give them feedback on their successes and failures, so they know what to do more, or less of, in their practice. Hundreds of repetitions will make these English sounds, which initially seem so awkward and uncomfortable, more natural feeling and sounding. For instructional guidance on how to teach these sounds to your students, please refer to American English for Japanese Speakers, Teach Pronunciation Better, Parts 1 and 2. In these e-guides, I share my knowledge and methods for helping Japanese speakers gain mastery over the sounds of American English. p.s.
